1 Fire: 319 Shovel Creek IC: Rob Allen	<p>10,808 acres \$10.6M 16% 763 personnel 741 residents in Level 1, Ready 180 residents In level 2, Set 52 residents in Level 3, Go Total of 973 structures No significant changes from 209 Left flank from Murphy Dome on to Chatanika, continue to secure line, that's where we are making most progress Down at Chatanika, both east and west, structure group are improving structure protections in place</p>

	<p>East flank from Chatanika River up to the McCloud subdivision, putting final touches</p> <p>Southern Flank: along old Murphy Dome road looking good, holding and improving, keeping track of burning operations from there</p> <p>Firing operations in section 2 (Martin Subdivision back up to Murphy Dome) was real successful</p> <p>Yesterday fire activity picked up early in the am, able to add more depth</p> <p>Major safety concerns: smoke, may limit ability to fly,</p> <p>Minor green injury: bug bite</p> <p>Tactical Aircraft needs: depends if we can fly, would use fire bosses and helicopters</p>

Able to utilize helicopters to keep that in check</p> <p>North side: continue protection</p> <p>East flank: inserted crew to triage structures up Resurrection Pass Trail</p> <p>SE corner: along Sterling corridor, 3 opportunities to put in lines to prevent further east spread towards Cooper Landing today up the Skyline Trail at MP 60</p> <p>Continue mopping up on west end near community of Sterling</p> <p>hazard tree removal going along south end along powerline corridor</p> <p>Political issues: Heavy hwy travel coming through town and continued smoke in outlying communities</p> <p>Closures: Chugach is in process of closing Resurrection Trail south of Devil’s Path cabin</p> <p>Safety Concerns: Hwy travel and smoke</p> <p>Allergic reaction, non-life threatening</p> <p>Critical resource needs: on 209</p> <p>Adding Chugach NF to delegation of authority today</p>

<p>5 Fire: 429 Montana Creek IC: Bentwood Reid</p>	<p>367 acres 30% 117 personnel \$912K Level 1 evac notice for residence with access through South Montana Creek Rd, approx.. 29 structures Crews made good progress w/mop up due to very shallow duff layer Div. Z: able to get 15-25 feet secured in southern portion and 10 ft on eastern portion Div A: 25 feet all the way across the division which is most of the north side of the fire Today: continue to mop up, hit problem areas and do sweeps to the green to ensure no spot fires we haven't detected Alaska Strike team demobilized this morning Norther Strike team, J-Bear task force will demob today leaving us with the Burrough Strike Team Released one helicopter, other moved to Big Lake for staging Rainier T2Crew arrived yesterday Safety concerns: Driving, lots of traffic, narrow roads Critical needs on 209</p>
